Low Expectations

- Lesbian & bisexual women are twice as likely to have never had a cervical smear test
- 21% thought that LGB women were at lower risk of cervical cancer
- Half of lesbian women are not out to their GP
- 1 in 5 lesbian and women have deliberately harmed themselves
- 1 in 4 gay and bisexual men have never been tested for STIs
- 41% of LG&B people over 55 live alone compared to 28% heterosexual people
- 1 in 6 LGB are not confident that their GP and other health services would be able to understand and meet their needs

What can you do?

E,D&I Policy

Targeting services specifically at LGBT+ patients

Patient experience surveys

Auditing policies to examine their impact

Display gay-friendly policies

Use images of same-sex couples and their families in promotion materials

Ensure preventative health messages don't exclude gay people

What can you do?

- Don't assume people will open up about their sexual orientation
- Train staff on why patient's sexual orientation may be relevant
- Train staff to explain to patients why the patient's sexual orientation may be relevant
- Open-ended questions
- Acknowledge when a patient tells you they are gay
- Display clear policies on confidentiality and non-discrimination
