Tinnitus

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Most common causes of Tinnitus

HEARING LOSS – Conductive and sensory

EMOTIONAL - Stress /Anxiety/ Depression

PHYSICAL -Infections / Dizziness / Trauma
(head injury)

When to refer to ENT

- Sudden unilateral hearing loss (within 90 days)
- Pulsatile tinnitus or tinnitus described as a crackling , popping or clicking noise.
- Persistent otalgia or aural discharge, affecting either ear (90 days)
- Vertigo
- Patients under the age of 50 years
- Wax

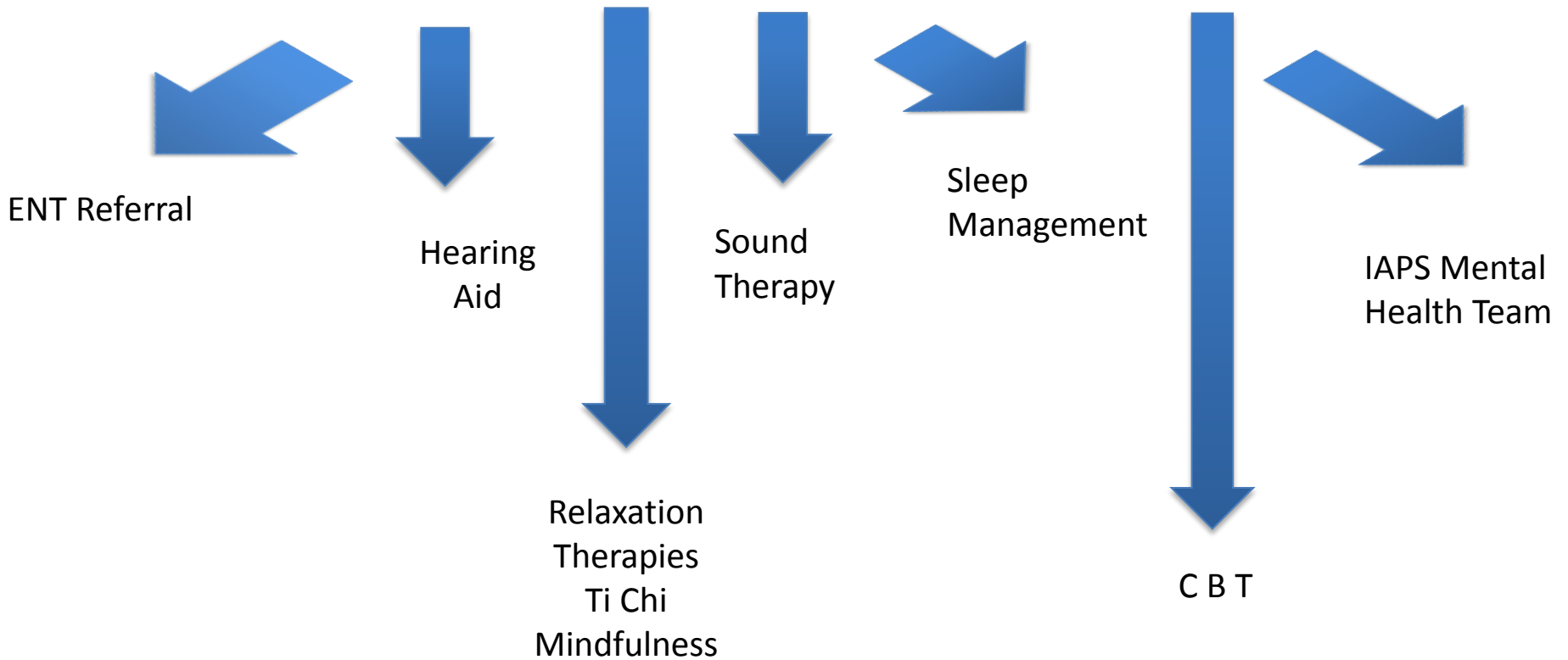
When to refer to Audiology

- Adults over 50 years complaining of persistent, troublesome tinnitus, should be referred to Audiology
- Referrals can be made by using choose and book tinnitus appointments clinics (Tuesday mornings)

What happens in the Tinnitus Clinic

- Medical History taken
- Discussion about the problems they are currently experiencing
- Hearing test
- Tinnitus Mechanisms
- Individual Treatment Plan
